

Quilt Musing for April 2011

I have a big plastic bin of little scraps. (Who doesn't!) They drive me a bit crazy, as I couldn't figure out what to do with them. I can't seem to make myself throw them out because each piece appears to be big enough to do SOMETHING with, but as a pile, (bunch, collection, whump - I'm not sure of the correct collective noun here) they are too small to do much with. My problem might be alleviated if I was in to appliqué, but I'm not - so I don't look at the little pieces and think that they would be perfect for some appliqué project in the future. I also have discovered (it is good to know these things about oneself!) that I really like patterns. I don't mean instructions for putting something together. I mean, when you hold a guilt top up, you can see a pattern - not just random squares, triangles and rectangles. I want to see a repeating pattern, and secondary patterns strike me as especially clever! I like to see the use of individual quilt blocks add up to something more!

I have a book that I bought that has one pattern that to me is entirely random. You know how quilting books will often have the same quilt in more than one colour? I can't even tell if the second quilt is the same orientation as the first one (One is done in blues and one is reds). I will never make that quilt - it just doesn't appeal. So imagine my surprise when I found a couple of absolutely random patterns on the internet for scrap quilts. One, I have just looked at - it is called strings - and uses various sizes of strips to make the blocks. I haven't tried this, but in the end you get a quilt that has squares with diagonal strips on them.

The other was called Crumbs. And I have made 12 little 4 1/2 inch crumb blocks. The premise is that you can use all those little bits and pieces, the chunks off the chop suey quilt strips, the little triangles that you snip off of snowball

blocks, anything that is left over and too big to throw out but too small to use for anything else. And you just sew them together - the only rule is - the seams MUST be straight. (Otherwise your blocks will not lie flat - which may present a bit of a problem when it comes to quilting them!)

It is ABSOLUTELY freeing to pull these little pieces of fabric out of the box, turn them until they fit onto another piece and then sew them together - after all, they are basically garbage, so you are getting (in my mind, anyway) something for nothing! Once I have a few sewn together, I trim the seams to 1/4 of an inch, and set that bit aside until I have another little strip made. Then I put the two strips together. I continue adding to the block this way until the block is big enough to trim using the 4 1/2 inch acrylic ruler. They are completely, awesomely, madly random and I LOVE them, even though I'm not sure why.

My beloved husband looked at my 12 little blocks, which I was so proud of, and asked, innocently, "What are you going to do with them?" And my answer? A blank stare... I have to DO something with them? "Placemats?" I asked tentatively. The expression on his face was telling. (Perhaps he was picturing indigestion from eating his meals on wildly coloured placemats!)

So I'm thinking I'll make more. And then I'll put a plain (and bright) sashing between them, a bright border around the whole thing, and make a wall hanging or a lap quilt for the quilting studio. After all, it is not often that you get something for nothing!

Enjoy your quilting, random or patterned!

 The Common Thread Quilt Guild collects monthly donations of Cuddle Quilts for use at the General Campus of the Ottawa Hospital. 66 were delivered in March.

The 3,500th Cuddle Quilt (CQ) was turned in at the March meeting!

Since the first recorded donation in 1997, we have delivered 3,526 Cuddle Quilts to the General Hospital! As a token of our appreciation for all your generosity, the 11 quilters who turned in CQ's at the last meeting will receive a gift in April:

SIZE MATTERS: Check out the size requirements: for optimum utility, please make your Cuddle Quilts 18" x 24", or make them 22" square. Our battings and backings are cut 24"x 24" to finish 22" square.

- We support the Violence Against Women program with child/teen/adult themed Comfort Quilts (40" x 60"). The next delivery will be in April. They can use both child quilts and adult quilts.
- 3) We support the St. Mary's Community Outreach Centre with baby/child themed quilts (anything from 30" x 40" to 40" x 60"). The young mothers benefit from counseling and instruction.
- 4) CHEO Children's Oncology We have committed to supply 50-60 child (anything from 30" x 40" to 40" x 60") and 20 teenage (40" x 60") quilts for the CHEO Children's Oncology unit.

 Thanks to your hard work, we need

only 5 more child sized quilts to deliver in June. If you have signed out a child quilt kit, please return it finished by May. If you intend to return it as a sewn top, please return it by April so that the quilting can be completed by another guild member!

Thank you for taking the time to vote at our March meeting. We received 104 votes. "Quilts in Bloom" received the highest number with 24 votes. Tied for second place with 11 votes each were: Pieceful Expressions; Treasured Threads, and The Fabric of Life.

Now that we have a Quilt Show theme – **Quilts in Bloom** – it is on with the art design for our publicity materials and time for you to think about the quilts that will be blooming in your garden.



Interested in a Different Kind of Sewing Project?

As Vicky mentioned at the February meeting, The Neonatal ICU at the General Hospital (where we donate cuddle quilts) has asked whether anyone is interested in duplicating some of their isolate and machine covers. Due to unforeseen circumstances, I was not able to bring samples to the March meeting, but I have photos and patterns, and would make samples if someone is interested in sewing these up.

These covers are simple sewing projects that are generally larger pieces cut and then serged or bound with purchased binding. My thought is to use bed covers from a thrift store as they are either already quilted, or thick enough so that light doesn't penetrate. Of course, you may have some of these hanging around your home already.

There are 3 styles and in order to double the supply, it would be a final total of 28, however, no one person needs to commit to sewing all of them. One or two is fine. Hopefully a few people will be interested. It is also a long term project, so no deadlines — unless it helps you finish a project — in that case, I'll be happy to give you a deadline.
