## Quilt Musings for June

On a long drive recently, I had time to ponder. (I had LOTS of time to ponder - I drove to Moncton, New Brunswick on Friday - which, if you are interested, takes 12 hours pretty nearly exactly from Ottawa to the airport there.) And I was thinking of topics to ramble on about in this little column. And one of the topics was why I joined our Quilt Guild, and when I thought about it, I began to wonder what got me interested in quilting in the first place.

I had an acquaintance who had caught the quilting bug from her mother. I was pregnant with my second child, who is now 25 years old, and this girl was younger than $I$ was, but she asked her mother to mail her a baby panel (we were living in Germany at the time and everything like that was mailed from Canada) and she showed me how to sandwich it, how to create a frame, and how to hand quilt it. I have to tell you, I was the fastest hand quilter in the world - the frame was precisely at eye level for my son who was just over 3 at the time, and all I could imagine was that he was going to poke one of his eyes out on the darned thing. I completed the entire hand quilting of a 34 by 48 inch quilt in four days! She came over and put prairie points on the edges and showed me the method of hand sewing the binding that $I$ still use today and I had the whole thing finished in less than a week. Really, finishing something that fast should have set me off as a quilter instantly, but it was another 10 years before I did another single thing with a quilting needle.

In Calgary, there was a Ladies' Morning Out at the Church around the corner from me. I took calligraphy lessons, made a lovely little hanging thing that $I$ think I threw out when I staged my house (darn!), a tree angel for my Christmas tree and eventually, we managed to talk one of the ladies into teaching us how to quilt. My friend and I went out and bought the required fabric. We had NO clue how to shop for fabric and we ended up buying two solid colours (pink and blue in my case) and two fabrics with flowers (again, pink and blue - and in my case, from the same collection - so two fabrics that had precisely the same print on them and which matched the two solids.) I still have the resultant quilt, all hand-pieced and all hand-quilted. I folded it over the back of a love seat that the movers managed to tear - it hid the tear perfectly, and now one half of the quilt is faded nearly to white and the other half is still the original colours. (Yes, pink and blue!)

I made a bag in that class which I gave to a friend and $I$ made a wall hanging, which I managed to finish about 9 years AFTER I moved here.

It was a member of the Guild who got me 'into' Quilting here in Ottawa. She brought a denim quilt that her daughter, who was about 12 or 14 at the time, made to a Girl Guide leaders meeting. And I was HOOKED! I fell in love with the ragged edged quilt and I HAD to have one of my own. The bed it is on is a king sized one, and the ragged edged quilt is not,

How does the committee work? You can sign out a bag of donated fabric to sew into a top or finished quilt; or sign out a quilt top to be quilted; or donate a quilt; or donate fabric and batting-come see us for details. Remember: we will pay for your batting if you quilt a quilt for us. You can contact us ahead of the meeting and we will bring a batt cut to the size of the quilt you have made.

## Cuddle Quilts

The Common Thread Quilt Guild collects monthly donations of Cuddle Quilts for use on the isolettes at the General Campus. The tiny at-risk babies look less clinical in their quilt-covered bed, and the families take the quilts home. Barb Donaldson can tell you more about sizes, can show you patterns, and can give you donated fabrics and batting. Thirty-two Cuddle Quilts were delivered in May. The generous donation of Cuddle Quilts throughout this year has allowed the General to stockpile for the summer months when we do not make donations. Thank you!

## Victims of Violence

We support the Victims of Violence outreach program
with young child/teen/adult themed Comfort Quilts ( 40 " x 60 "). Visit the table to read the thank-you card from five of the clients there who were gladdened by the receipt of one of our quilts. Twentyeight more quilts are ready to go after the June meeting. If you have a quilt finished for the June meeting, it will be added to the delivery. This delivery will be the last until late September.

## St. Mary's Community Outreach Centre

We support the St. Mary's Community Outreach Centre with baby/child themed quilts (anything from 30" x $40^{\prime \prime}$ to $40^{\prime \prime} \times 60^{\prime \prime}$ ). The young mothers benefit from counseling and instruction. Thirteen more quilts are ready to go after the June meeting. If you have a quilt finished for the June meeting, it will be added to the delivery. This delivery will be the last until late September.

Over the years, we have assembled quite a selection of male-themed fabrics and colours which we would like to use to make eleven $65^{\prime \prime} \times 80^{\prime \prime}$ single bed quilts to donate to the LifeHouse program administered by the Ottawa Mission. These quilts are not given away to their clients, but are there to decorate the rooms and make them a happier place for the men enrolled in the five-month program. Samples will be shown at the June meeting.

## WHAT YOU CAN DO TO HELP:

1) Go through your stash and donate homespun woven fabric for ragg quilts.
2) Go through that stash and donate malethemed or coloured fabrics. Go ahead-be sexist and give us dull colours, fall colours, geomet-rics-anything that looks like grampa's pajamas!
3) You know that pattern sheet we began distributing in April-called Cottage Industry? At the bottom of the back page, you see directions for producing striped 8 " blocks. Give us lots. We will need 99 per quilt. (Victoria will say a special thank-you to anyone who signs out a bag of our fabric to do them with! And you will be entered in the contest.) The patterns are also available on the website.
