Quilt Musings

I like to buy quiflt magazines. In fact, I like to buy them so much that I have often discovered that I have more than one copy of the same magazine... This happens because, in my former life, I might buy the magazine and leave it in the bag for a few days (or a week or two) due to being busy. (We could call it due to disorganization, but why be cruel?)

Then I would be at a store that sold magazines and I would see one that didn't look familiar and buy it. After awhile ALL the covers look alike — like those romance novels (called bodice rippers) with the pictures of the topless men on them — how could you possibly remember if you had read THAT particular one. (In fact, you might get most of the way through the book before you would realize that you HAD read that particular one before...) Okay, I digress.

Back to the quilt magazines. Here's the point (such as it is.) Do you find it difficult to decide if you do or don't like a pattern, if you don't like the colour combination that they used in the magazine? And I have the opposite problem too. If I really like the colours, I find it difficult to decide that I wouldn't like to make that particular pattern... (I'm not keen on curves for some reason - I think I have an allergy to that much work!)

That's why I (especially) like magazines that have a small piece of the quilt done in different colours after they describe all the steps to the main one. (Although I will admit, if I didn't like the original colours, I quite often have difficulty getting my head around the colours in the second offering as well.)

I am also not a fan of Hallowe'en. Oh, I liked it well enough when I was a kid, but I seem to have gone all humbug about it now. And so I don't make Hallowe'en quilts. Too much work for something that I would only put on the table or the wall for a short time, especially as I'm not enjoying the time it would be out. (I do have some Christmas things, which I enjoyed making, enjoy using, and regret putting away in January). I like autumn, and the fall colours, it is just Hallowe'en that I have gone all humbug over.

I have a quilt magazine that has a quilt in 'my' colours on the cover. I just love it. Blues and browns. So pretty! It even has some plaid fabric (which I just love to incorporate into a quilt).

When I opened the magazine, imagine my horror to discover that the blocks which I thought of as Snowballs, are actually PUMPKINS - the thing is a guilt covered with pumpkins. My first thought with pumpkins is Jack o' lanterns and I put the magazine in the appropriate magazine holder with some regret and a sigh. I don't do Hallowe'en. But now that I am thinking about it, could the whole thing be a Thanksgiving Quilt? The magazine was, no doubt, published in the States, I likely bought it after Canadian Thanksgiving and before Hallowe'en, which I was already starting to Humbug about last year when I found the magazine. But maybe they weren't aspiring Jack o' Lanterns, maybe they were the basis for pumpkin pies?!?

Perhaps I'd better go and dig that magazine up and see how many rusty browns I have in my stash; perhaps that pattern is right up my alley! Have a great time quilting now that Hallowe'en has passed for another year!

Community Projects

How does the committee work?

You can sign out a bag of donated fabric to sew into a top or finished quilt; or sign out a quilt top to be quilted; or donate a quilt; or donate fabric and batting—come see us for details. **Remember:** we will pay for your batting if you quilt a quilt for us, or contact us ahead of the meeting and we will bring a batt cut to the size of the quilt you have made.

1. The Common Thread Quilt Guild collects monthly donations of Cuddle Ouilts for use on the isolettes at the General Campus. The tiny at-risk babies look less clinical in their quilt-covered bed, and the families take the quilts home. Barb Donaldson can tell you more about sizes, can show you patterns, and can give you donated fabrics and batting. Two hundred and twenty-five were turned in at the September meeting. A big thank you to Kay Williams for the donation of 196!

Remember how we had to cancel the December meeting last year due to winter weather? Anyone wishing to give Christmas Cuddle Quilts must turn them in at the November

meeting. We already have a dozen, so feel good about that if you meant to make one but didn't have the time!

out the new size requirements: for optimum utility, please make your Cuddle Quilts 18" x 24", or make them 22" square. Our battings and backings are cut 24"x 24" to finish 22" square. It is up to you to provide for the 18" x 24".

- 2. We support the *Victims of Violence* outreach program with young child/teen/adult themed Comfort Quilts (40" x 60".)
- 3. We support the *St. Mary's Community Outreach Centre* with baby/child themed quilts (anything from 30" x 40" to 40" x 60"). The young mothers benefit from counseling and instruction.

New for 2010

We have committed to making eleven 65" x 80" single bed quilts to donate to the *LifeHouse* program administered by the Ottawa Mission. These quilts are not given away to their clients, but are there to decorate the rooms and make them a happier place for the men enrolled in the five-month program.

How to help

We now have the last two kits ready to be assembled for the Mission: you get 99 striped squares, 99 batting squares, and 99 backing squares ready for you to quilt, join, and clip the seams. The target for donation is December. Seven of the eleven quilts promised have been completed. Can you help with the last two?

Labels

Ladies, even though you are encouraged to be creative in your quilting activities, we ask you to be a conformist when attaching labels to Guild community project quilts! Please follow the guidelines below when labeling your Cuddle Quilt, or any larger quilt:

- Turn the quilt face down.
 Locate the lower right corner.
- 2. Place the label diagonally across the corner with the words facing you
- 3. Either pin or baste the outside edge of the quilt to the label. Trim the excess label.
- 4. Attach binding to the quilt edge, catching in the edges of the label. You do not have to sew down the long edges.

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ROAD TRIP

Textile Museum of Canada

My husband and I recently made a weekend trip to Toronto to celebrate our anniversary and to see the "Jersey Boys" musical, the story of Frankie Valli and The Four Seasons – very entertaining! I had forgotten how many wonderful songs they produced until this show reminded me ... apparently they are among the top 5 selling groups of the 1960s—the other four are the Beatles, Supremes, Elvis Presley, and the Rolling Stones. Pretty good company!

However, the point of this story is that while my husband visited the Hockey Hall of Fame, I made a trip to the Textile Museum of Canada to see the exhibit "Kaleidoscope". These antique quilts from the collection of Carole and Howard Tanenbaum are amazing! The exhibit includes crazy quilts, log cabin quilts, and many other pieced and appliquéd quilts. There is one signature quilt from New Hampshire in which some of the blocks include the age of the signer and the year that she signed the quilt. It was a truly magical and humbling experience for me to notice "Lucy Sawyer, 1890, age 96" and "Sarah Ann Sawyer, age 98, 1887"—these blocks were signed by women who were born in 1794 and 1789 respectively!

This is a great little museum in downtown Toronto and often has something of interest for quilters (I saw some Kaffe Fassett quilts there a few years ago). These 43 antique quilts are on display until March 21, 2010 and are well worth a visit.
