## Quilt Musing Jane maddin

I have been thinking about Quilt Labels a lot lately. I have a really good reason. And it starts with my Grandmother. My Dad's mom was a tiny little lady with white curly hair who always wore a dress and apron. In the whole time that my mother knew her, my grandmother NEVER had a cross word for anyone. She taught me how to knit (multiple times) and had beautiful flower gardens. Her first name was Gladys and I thought it was hilarious at the age of 11 when she told me her friends called her Happy Bottom when she was a girl. She was born in 1899.

In the early 1970s, when I was a teenager, she was hand piecing a quilt. I didn't pay an particular attention to it, and I can barely remember her working on it when we were there on holidays in the summer. Grammy made quilts for their original purpose - to recycle fabric into warm bedding. Their house had no indoor plumbing, and no central heating. The kitchen was heated by the coal oil/wood stove and there was a wood furnace that they set up in the living room in the winter. The rest of the house; two bedrooms and the dining room were not heated (i.e., read FREEZING cold in the winter). So quilts were a must.

After I was married, my grandmother died and my mother and father cleared out her house. They brought back three of grandma's quilts - two rather pretty ones AND the one that I had watched her piece. I inherited that quilt. Grammy used the quilt on her bed. I used the quilt on my bed and then on the spare room bed. Last winter I took it off the bed and folded it up - it was beginning to come apart - some of it at the seams, and some of it was simply fraying to pieces. I didn't dare wash it!

This summer I got the quilt out and looked at it. I think that Grammy must have bought some muslin and some solid mustard yellow fabric to go with the pieces of fabric that she had on hand. Mustard yellow not my favourite, but some of the blocks were really pretty. (Some not so much.) Some were not cotton, and the cotton-polyester had frayed apart. I hemmed and I hawed. I pondered. I shared on Facebook. And finally I took out a pair of scissors and cut out three complete, salvageable blocks and my favourite block which was

not complete (and part of another block so that I could make that one complete). I took pictures of the progress, including holding up the black garbage bag and bundling the bulk of my Grandmother's quilt into it. (My husband thought I was crazy for taking a picture of the garbage bag!) The quilt had been tied with yellow yarn, and stuffed with something gossamer and white. Then I handwashed the four blocks using an old style soap and carefully appliquéd them onto a piece of white on white fabric that will not (at least) detract from the original blocks. I will trim that eventually and machine quilt it (to within an inch of its life) to stabilize the blocks.

What does all this have to do with quilt labels you ask? Well, I'll tell you. There was no label on the quilt. I don't know whether anyone besides my grandmother pieced the blocks. I didn't know the name of the pattern - although someone on Facebook did! I do not know what the batting was (maybe washed wool right off the sheep!), I didn't know how long it took Grandma to make it, whether someone helped her with the tying, who put the binding on, and whether the fabric she used was taken from clothing she disassembled, or from bags of scrap she had left over, had bought or was given.

When I get my little wall hanging done, you may rest assured that I will be putting ALOT of information on the back! Who made the blocks originally, and roughly when; the name of the pattern, how I altered it, what the batting is composed of and how I quilted it. I believe I'll give this to my daughter, who when she saw the pictures of the quilt with big pieces cut out of it, wailed, "But I loved that quilt!" over the internet from Calgary. I truly do think that Grammy would have approved though! । felt happy while I was cutting it up (even though one of my cats nearly lost a paw. She LOVES quilts on the floor!) I will remember Grammy every time I look at this wall hanging!

## Community Projects committee: Barb Donaldson, Catherine Senecal, and Victoria Vanderlinden

How do you help? You can sign out a bag of donated fabric to sew into a top or finished quilt; or sign out a quilt top to be quilted; or donate a quilt, backing or batting.

1) The Common Thread Quilt Guild collects monthly donations of Cuddle Quilts for use at the General Campus of the Ottawa Hospital. Our goal for 2011-2012 is 350. 46 were delivered last month.

2) We support the Violence Against Women program and Seniors programs at the Eastern Ottawa Resource Centre with adult themed Comfort Quilts (40" x 60").
3) We support the St. Mary's Community Outreach Centre with baby/child themed quilts (anything from $30 " \times 40 "$ to $\left.40^{\prime \prime} \times 60 "\right)$. The young mothers benefit from counseling and instruction.
4) CHEO Children's Oncology -We have committed to supplying 20 child (anything from 30" x 40" to 40" x 60") and 20 teenage ( $40^{\prime \prime} \times 60^{\prime \prime}$ ) quilts for the CHEO Children's Oncology unit. Last year they needed several for the 2-10 year olds. Lately they are seeing a need for the young teen age group, and there is always a surge in new cases just before Christmas. We will be making our first delivery in early December. For best usage, give unisex quilts with no age specific fabrics: i.e.. cuddly plaid flannel is OK, nothing too pink and girly, nothing with baby toys, think bright and geometric or summer camping.


## NEW and NEWS

5) You ladies are so generous with your talents that Victoria is always looking for more places to give Guild quilts. This year, we have committed to giving quilts to three orphanages in Chernobyl, Belarus. The client ages range from newborn to adult, because being handicapped in Belarus means being sidelined forever. The "orphans" include deserted children, children of missing parents, malformed children and the physically/mentally handicapped. They need quilts to keep them warm in their antiquated buildings. Make us any theme, any size, and we can depend on volunteers taking them over and personally delivering them.
Please turn them in by the December meeting. (If you signed out something a long time ago, this would be a good time to get 'er done.)

Remember that to be eligible for the prizes drawn in November, the following rules must have been followed:

- The two meters signed out must have been used up. No returns!
- Quilt TOPS must be no larger than $42^{\prime \prime} \times 62^{\prime \prime}$ and the label must be returned
- Finished QUILTS must be a minimum of $40^{\prime \prime} \times 60^{\prime \prime}$ or can be larger.
- The label must be attached to the finished quilt.
- Cuddle Quilts ( $22^{\prime \prime} \times 22^{\prime \prime}$ or $18^{\prime \prime} \times 24^{\prime \prime}$ ) must have a label attached.

## Quilt Show 2012

## Linda Won

Have you decided on the quilt or quilts you plan to enter in our Quilt Show? I am sure the ideas are budding and your quilt will be in full bloom by next Spring.

## Remember...

- Entrants must hold a valid membership (2011-2012) in the CTQG;
- Only members as of December 31, 2011 will be eligible for prizes; and
- Your entry must not have been displayed at a previous quilt show put on by the CTQG.


## Categories

We have 8 categories for which you could win 1st, 2nd or 3rd prize. The categories are:

## BED QUILTS:

1. LARGE: a quilt with a perimeter of 340 " or more
2. MEDIUM: a quilt with a perimeter of 270 " -339 "
3. SMALL: a quilt with a perimeter of $269^{\prime \prime}$ or less

## WALL QUILTS:

A quilt that is designed to be hung for decorative purposes. These will be grouped according to the following criteria.
4. PIECED: more than $50 \%$ pieced
5. APPLIQUÉ, MIXED and OTHER TECHNIQUES: more than $50 \%$ appliquéd or quilts using other techniques such as embellishment, embroidery; whole cloth quilts, etc.
6. MINIATURE: The quilt must have a perimeter less than $96^{\prime \prime}$ total. If blocks are used they must be $3^{\prime \prime}$ or less. A bound full-size block is not considered a miniature. The overall pattern must show a miniaturization of a quilt.
7. ART QUILT: The work as a whole must be original in concept, be made primarily of fabric and may incorporate unconventional techniques and embellishments.

## CLOTHING \& ACCESSORIES:

8. Fashionable and wearable items, a visible portion of which includes quilting.

Members may enter up to five (5) pieces (excluding challenge wall hangings and workshop projects). So please, start working on your quilts. Your effort is what will make our show a success.
