

Merry Christmas, Happy Hanukkah and Happy New Year to all.












Successful Scrap Quilts from Simple Rectangles (737) by Judy Turner and Margaret Rolfe shows what you can do with one shape, the rectangle. This book contains 45 scrap designs and discusses fabric choices with regards to colour, value and style. Basic design elements such as contrast, repetition, and balance are illustrated. 15 patterns are included.

Novice and experienced quilters who wish to make scrap quilts will find this book useful.



Easy Modern Quilts (M537) from Fons and Porter (Winter 2016) has patterns which can be pieced quickly. There are also quilt tips along side each pattern so you can make it your own.



Quiltmaker's 100 Blocks (M538) has patterns for 100 different blocks to piece and applique.



While the first snowflakes of winter were falling, our guild workshoppers were engrossed in the art of cheesecloth portraiture, offered by Mary Pal, whose goal was to teach us "everything I know about this technique by the time you leave tomorrow." On Day 1 of our two-day workshop, everyone worked on the same portrait, designed to teach the basic skills of manipulating glue and cheesecloth. It was more fun than kindergarten – and not nearly as messy!

The magic happened on the second day, when imaginations soared as beloved pets, a rooster, an owl, trees and elephants came to life. As Mary said later, "I was so impressed with what (the students) accomplished and delighted with the independent work. It is always helpful to have the first day where they learn the basic technique, but it is another thing entirely to apply it to another pattern - possibly their own - and that cements the technique. It is clear all of them "got" it. I hope they will stay in touch and show me finished work! What a thoroughly lovely bunch of gals."

Quilts Bring Comfort to Syrian Refugee Family Irene Walker

After a wait of over a year, a Syrian refugee family of five was finally welcomed to Canada in early November. Sponsored by St. Bartholomew's Anglican Church, the mom and dad, two boys aged 12 and 10 and girl aged 7, were happy and relieved to arrive in their new home and to be reunited with other family members. A brother of the mom, together with his wife and two daughters, aged 4 and 2, were on hand at the airport to greet them, having arrived in Canada themselves less than a year ago. Tears and hugs were the order of the day.

Members of our Guild, under the leadership of Sherida Giddings, were prepared with five bed quilts for the new arrivals. Participants in this project included "The Dancing Mice," (a mini-group which meets on Mondays), long-arm quilters Gudmund Thompson ("The Silver Fox") and Michele Gagne, and piecers Adele Sauve and Elaine Harfield.

How were they received? Well, let me tell you the story, as a member of the sponsorship group at St. Bart's, and a member of the Guild).

I was helping with the move into their small townhouse, and brought the quilts upstairs when nobody was looking, just throwing them on the beds to give the bare rooms some colour. The father of the family came upstairs just then to invite me for a coffee – everything and everybody stops for a shot of strong Arabic coffee periodically – and I showed him the quilt for his daughter first, with the label showing the message "Welcome to Canada" and her name. I should mention that their English is extremely limited, and communication occurs with a lot of facial expressions and hand signals.

Now I haven't known him for long, but I know him well enough to know that he is absolutely crazy about his little girl. He was just delighted. Then I took him to the boys' bedroom, and showed him the quilts on the bunk beds, also individually labelled. He was so grateful, and started calling out for his wife to come upstairs. Just before she made it up the stairs, I showed him the Lone Star Quilt on their own bed. As mom came up the stairs, he quickly turned her away from the master bedroom (so she couldn't see it) to show her the quilts on the children's beds. She was very moved



to think that people had done this for their children, and kept saying, "Thank you, thank you," over and over.

Then Dad made a long face, sighed heavily, and said, "No for you, me," as he led Mom to the master bedroom. When she saw the quilt on the bed, he burst out laughing delightedly, and she flipped over the end to check if there was a label with their names on it. There was! There were hugs all around. It's a few minutes I'll remember for a long time.

Just as a footnote, when I returned upstairs from having the coffee, some stuffed animals and pillows had already taken up residence on the beds, and the two boys had carefully folded over their quilts so that the backs were showing – in order to protect the pretty tops!
