VICE PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE

I missed both the deadline for the November newsletter and completing the little cuddle quilt to hand in this past meeting.

While finishing one small quilt monthly is a self-imposed deadline, it is still disappointing that I did not manage to do it. I have some quilting left and the binding. I almost finished; alas, 'almost' is just not good enough. So this month I am left to contemplate how we go about getting things done.

A member wrote me about the procrastinators club and that she never got around to joining. I'm fairly certain she was just trying to make me feel better as I do not believe for a moment that she is a procrastinator.

I've had discussions with other members and am pleased that you are participating in this informal 'challenge'. It's interesting that some of you are making your quilts in batches. You have told me you'll be bringing all ten to the table in December or January. Others have done two or three per month, are taking a little break and will get back at it in the new year. Are you making your quilts the same pattern, or the same colours? Is that what I should have done? Is this another time saving 'technique' someone should have taught me?

Am I a procrastinator or have I committed to too much? I know I have a scheduling problem. I'm not organized and don't keep a tasks list. There exist these mental lists of what I'd like to do and then the biggest factor of the equation is <u>time</u>. Unfortunately, I am far too familiar with the amount of time everything <u>used</u> to take vs. how long it takes now. I cannot seem to let go of this old information and that just skews everything. I should also acknowledge that, more than a few times, some of you have told me I am underestimating the effort. Okay, so maybe my 'timeline information' was never practical.

I also get ridiculous last minute ideas and run with them. Who but me decides a quilt needs to be made two weeks before a flight to Austria or Alberta? Could I not have had these thoughts months before, when the flight was booked? Fortunately, I never have to shop for fabric and, to this date, I have somehow managed to get these quilts done. I can recall at least five flights where I have used the time to sew bindings down. There is no problem bringing the needle and thread on board, just make sure your scissors are small and have round tips. There: that's my tip for you. The downside, of course, is the quilt takes up a lot of precious carry-on real estate. (Just an aside: sometimes you can bring binding work to a quilt show set-up day and a quilt fairy will help you).

Sounds like it's time for me to make some changes to my modus operandi. No, I don't know Latin, but isn't the internet the greatest? Oh dear, that might be another area where I could waste spend less time.

The next guild meeting is after the Sew Day; I plan to be at that Sew Day, finishing my two little quilts. There is absolutely no point in thinking about last minute Christmas gifts.

I'd also like to remind you that our guild is run by members who volunteer to be on our executive. Our constitution (on the website) outlines responsibilities. Perhaps you can take a look and decide what you may have a flair for and would like to participate in. I'd like to hear from you. Voting for a new executive is still over six months away, but it's never too early to plan – I'm not sure I have learnt it, but that's my lesson this month.

And now for the good news! You will have all summer to work on finishing your mystery quilt with the big parade of quilts to be displayed at the September meeting.












COMMUNITY PROJECT NEWS

Cuddle Quilts – The cuddle quilts collect ed by our Guild go to the neonatal unit of the General Hospital and are delivered to the hospital directly after the monthly Guild meeting. It's great that we have Guild members challenging each other in making cuddle quilts. Each year we have just about made our goal of 500 cuddle quilts but it looks like this year we may surpass that goal! We are publishing in this newsletter the total number of cuddle quilts received to date for the year. Since September of this year (so in three months) we have received 200 cuddle quilts. This is great news! Thank you to everyone for helping the tiny at-risk babies.
