Dear Members:

Spring has almost arrived, and with it comes Quilt Show season. Being a relatively new quilter, I am still amazed at the number of quilt shows that happen, not only around eastern Ontario, but across the country and the continent. Who knew? Before I began quilting, I certainly didn't.



The first quilt show I attended, ever, was held in Vulcan, Alberta, for the town's centennial in 2013. That was when I fell in love with quilts. Later that year I was given my first quilt for Christmas and over a year later, for my 50th birthday I was given a quilt that I had fallen in love with at that first quilt show. Thus my odyssey began.

My second quilt show, was our quilt show, in May of 2016, which I had three quilts in. I have been to a few quilt shows since then, including Quilt Canada last year and this year have plans to attend the "Festival of Quilts – Quilts in Living Color" in Calgary, AB. This is an outdoor quilt show being held at Heritage Park, a turn of the century park, similar to Upper Canada Village. It will be my first outdoor quilt show and I can only imagine the logistics involved.

Speaking of logistics, our quilt show planning is well underway as you know, so I hope you are all pondering which of your creations you will be sharing with the inhabitants and visitors of our town. As in previous years, guests will not be allowed to touch the quilts, however, in helping with the set up, I can assure you I will be happily fondling your fabrics and beautiful creations.

VICE PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE

Oh, the cuddle quilts!!

103 – That's how many I took to the General Hospital's NICU last month! Do you know how hard it is to manoeuvre one of those extra wide wheelchairs through hallways and elevators and then a door that does not have a wheelchair 'open' function? I think I would have left several dents in the walls, had they not been equipped with those stainless steel panels that deal with people like me who cannot seem to direct a wheelchair through small spaces. That wheel chair was about three feet wide! I had our little quilts tipped upright and it was full! The nurses (three came to take the quilts) were in shock when summoned to the reception area. I believe one was still in shock the following day when she bumped into Catherine of Community Projects fame, and they discussed this 'motherload'! Clearly, our guild members have upped the ante and are über-responding to this informal challenge. Wow! Thank-you, Thank-you!

As for my part in this, I last confided I was 'one down', for a second time. I am happy to say I have caught up again; I brought two quilts to the table last month and decided to go for the 'twins'. My quilts were simple squares, alternating two colours with quilting that created a 'circle' around the seams. I brazenly did that without drawing lines, just eyeing the next 'juncture' and stepping on the 'gas', so to speak. I have been told a glass of wine helps with machine quilting and hey, who am I to argue with that — so, I happily tried it. Let's just say some of my lines were far more rounded than others and some had an abrupt sharp angle that is not usually representative of the arcs one sees in 'circles'. Now these faults were clearly not caused by the wine, as my shoulders were very much relaxed! Oh dear, how much practice I will need!!

2018 QUILT SHOW!!

It is time to register your quilts! Entry rules and registration forms are available on the guild website http:// commonthreadquiltquild.ca/quilt-show/quilt-show-registration/, or you may pick up the forms at the March or April guild meeting. Registering on-line is preferred. Please read the instructions carefully, and note the deadline of April 10, 2018. Any questions may be sent to ctgg.quilt.show.registrar@gmail.com

You must hold a valid membership (2017-2018) in the CTQG to enter your quilts in the show, and only members as of December 31, 2017 are eligible for prizes. Your entry must not have been displayed at a previous CTQG show.

The categories eligible for prizes (voted on by the show attendees) are:

BED QUILTS:

- 1. LARGE: a quilt with a perimeter of 350" or greater
- 2. MEDIUM: a quilt with a perimeter of 349" or less

WALL QUILTS: A quilt that is designed to be hung for decorative purposes. These will be grouped according to the following criteria:

- 3. PIECED: more than 50% pieced
- 4. APPLIQUÉ, MIXED and OTHER TECHNIQUES: more than 50% appliquéd, or using other techniques such as embellishment, embroidery; whole cloth quilts, etc.
- 5. MINIATURE: The quilt must have a perimeter less than 96" total. If blocks are used they must be 4" or less. A bound full-size block is not considered a miniature, neither is a hexie guilt made with pieces 1/2" or greater. The overall pattern must show a miniaturization of a quilt.
- ART QUILT: The work as a whole must be original in concept, be made primarily of fabric and may incorporate unconventional techniques and embellishments.
- 7. ASSORTED QUILT ITEMS*: Quilted clothing, placemats and runners, pillows, etc.
- *Two items sub mitted in this category are considered one entry to the show
- 8. MODERN (NEW): Modern quilters embrace functionality, simplicity and minimalism. Characteristics bold colours and prints, high contrast and graphic areas of solid colour, improvisamight include: use of tional piecing, minimalism, expansive negative space, and alternate grid work.
- CHILDREN'S THEME/CRIB (NEW): Intended use would be for a child's room either as a wall hanging or a small bed quilt. All techniques.

Members may enter up to four (4) pieces. Our space is limited, so we may have to limit entries to three. Please indicate on your registration form which guilt you prefer to be withdrawn. All categories must have a minimum of ten (10) items. The committee reserves the right to move an entry to a different category if appropriate.

Please, ENTER your guilts! Your guilts make the show a success!


