

Fat Quarter: Back to the Books

Hello Fellow Quilters:

As many of you have probably heard, Quilt Canada is coming to the EY Centre in Ottawa for June 13 to 15, 2019. Volunteers form the basis of a successful Quilt Canada and we are looking for your support and assistance. We are currently working to have an exciting lineup of classes and lectures booked, led by well known and capable International and national instructors. And preliminary plans in other areas are underway to lay the groundwork for a successful conference.

We are currently recruiting volunteers for the important Team Lead positions. These key volunteers will work closely with the CQA/ACC Conference Coordinator to deliver an amazing event. We are asking for your help in filling the following Team Lead positions:

Workshop Team Lead which will require about 15 hours per month prior to the Conference and full attendance for all of the days of the Conference, including set-up and takedown.

Volunteer Team Lead which will require about 15-20 hours per month from October to June and full attendance for all of the days of the Conference, including set-up and takedown.

Merchant Mall Team Lead which requires 2-5 hours per month prior to the Conference month prior to the Conference and full attendance for all of the days of the Conference, including set-up and takedown.

Logistics Team Lead requires approximately hours 5 per week for 4-8 weeks prior to the show and full attendance for all of the days of the Conference, including set-up and takedown.

Concurrent Shows Team Lead requires approximately 5 hours a week for two months prior to the Conference and full attendance for all of the days of the Conference, including set-up and takedown.

Publicity Team Lead requires approximately 5 hours a week starting 10 months ahead of the Conference and full attendance for all of the days of the Conference, including set-up and takedown.

Signage Team Lead requires approximately 5 hours a month, January to June and full attendance for all of the days of the Conference, including set-up and takedown.

Quilt Shows Set-up and Take Down Team Lead requires approximately 4 hours per week for 6-8 weeks prior to the show and full attendance for all of the days of the Conference, including set-up and takedown.

National Juried Show Coordinator requires approximately 10 hours a week for 3 months prior to the Conference and full attendance for all of the days of the Conference, including set-up and takedown. This position is suitable for a team of 2 to undertake.

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




We hope that you have been busy this summer creating beautiful quilts out of panels for the summer contest. Just a reminder that the quilts are due by the end of the October Guild meeting in order to qualify for the draw.

We still have a couple of panels available so if you want to get in on the contest (and you have lots of time in the next month), come to our Community Projects table and sign one out.

Contest rules: You take a printed panel, cut it up (or not) and make it into a quilt for us that we can then give to one of our charities. We have a few panels available (generously donated by Quilty Pleasures) or you can dig into your stash and find one to use. We only ask that you not use one that is limited to a specific time of year like Easter, Halloween or Christmas. If you don't have a panel but you have a fabric with a large print, you can use that instead. You could make a child's quilt or a larger quilt depending on the theme of the panel. The mechanical thrum stuttered through the dark apartment. Unable to sleep, Jack Morrow fed fabric through the old Singer, eyeing the stitching with every

push. These past few months, the sound occupied most of his time. The 94-year-old worked 10-hour days, missed meals and occasionally fell asleep at his machine. But he couldn't quit. After years of making quilts for needy newborns, he was determined to reach 500 by the time he turned 95.

"Unfortunately, I'm kind of that way," Morrow said. "Give me a project to do and I won't stop until it's done." In early August, he reached his goal, giving the blanket to <u>Bundles of Love</u>, a charity that distributes thousands of diapers, blankets and other baby essentials annually to families across the state. The blanket he finished days before his Aug. 10 birthday displayed big robot characters. Not his most complicated but, as he explained in blue-inked cursive on a yellow sticky note stuck to the quilt, "This one looked so cute. I couldn't cut it."

This journey started seven years ago, when Morrow and his wife, Jackie, 88, moved into the senior living apartment complex Realife Cooperative of Bloomington. Morrow's wife suggested her easily restless husband join a club that made blankets for Bundles of Love. Morrow knew little about sewing, but he thought he'd give it a shot. "My father has to be kept busy and he likes doing things with his hands," said his daughter, Nancy Dahlman. As he works, Morrow said he likes to imagine newborns cradled in his blankets' soft cotton — maybe a place to dry after a first bath. Usually Morrow sews in his apartment's spare bedroom, but sometimes he takes the operation upstairs. He carries scissors, pencils and other materials in an ad hoc tool belt sewn from spare materials and tied to his walker.

As he passed 50 blankets, 100, then bigger milestones, it became clear he wouldn't quit any time soon. "The momentum gets going," Morrow said. "And I still haven't lost it at 95."

Farm boy from Fargo Morrow was born Aug. 10, 1923, on a half-section farm outside Fargo. Growing up, he watched his father, an honest, kind North Dakotan, tend the animals and work the land. When old enough, the younger Morrow herded cattle in town. He loved detailed work, learning to reassemble a car engine and distributing rations to his unit of 3,500 people during World War II. When he left the Army, his brother got him a soldering job at an eyeglasses company. Soon, his penchant for organizing inventory and running tight operations earned him a seven-year tenure as president of Minneapolis-based Walman Optical.

In 1981, the City of Minneapolis gave millions of dollars to businesses, including Walman Optical, to hire disadvantaged teenagers for summer jobs. But Morrow told the Minneapolis Tribune at the time that he'd had his own version of the program since the 1950s. "We picked the ones who seemed to need the jobs the most," he said then.

A quilting mission Morrow is an unusual volunteer, said Jan Winstead, Bundles of Love's work group leader in the western Twin Cities area (bundlesoflove.org). The Apple Valley-based volunteer organization sends supplies to needy families, usually selected by hospitals, across 23 Minnesota counties. He's the only male quilter she knows, and the only person who approaches the work so intensely. That this process starts with seniors and ends with newborns isn't lost on Winstead. "It's kind of like one generation giving themselves for the new generation," she said. Jackie said her husband's dedication to quilting is amazing to see. But there are trade-offs to sharing him with the sewing machine.

"Sometimes, I miss a little bit of the company," she said. Morrow is getting tired, too. He says he's looking forward to a break. Winstead isn't sure. Days after stitching baby blanket number 500, Morrow called her to say that one of his daughters asked him why he hadn't made her one yet.

His hands are numb, his eyesight is going, and he just crossed the finish line in a years long journey. But how could say no?

Sandra and Carol, your workshop coordinators, are looking forward to offering several workshops for you this year.

First up will be a two-day workshop "I did that with my walking foot" that will be held on September 22 and 29.



While those who quilt with free-motion feet are busy practising, you'll be quilting directly on your project just by marking a few lines or guides. The walking foot can be used for more than just stitch in the ditch and straight lines. Irene will show you a dozen designs, all done with the walking foot. We will, of course, start with stitch-in-the-ditch and matchsticks just to get you warmed up, then on to fun stuff using stencils and templates. This is a two day workshop, although you can also attend just one day. This class was popular last year and sold out early.

Cost: (to be finalized this week):

1 day: \$35.00 members \$40.00 non-members

2 days: \$60.00 members, \$70 non-members

Also planned for the fall is the opportunity to make a mythical Nisse, learn Precision Piecing, make a T-shirt quilt, quickly make a 40 x 40, and make a special table runner. In the new year, we are planning to offer instruction on a different table runner with circle inserts, thread painting, reverse applique and a double disappearing nine patch. The show is open to all styles, and past show pieces can be seen on the website.


Deadline for entries is May 31st. There is no theme and there are minimal size constraints.
