
Merry Mayhem's Case #120

PART 6: The Final Chapter

Combine FOUR of the blocks you made during Part 5 so they look like the diagram, using 1/4" seams, and matching seams. It is not necessary to "match" any of the fabrics in these sets, so random selection is recommended.

Repeat with your remaining blocks. Press.

If you are making the Crib size project, you should now have SIX traditional "Corn and Beans" blocks, each measuring 16 1/2" square; OR (TWELVE) blocks if making the Lap size; OR [TWENTY] blocks if making the Twin size; OR {FORTY-TWO} blocks if making the Super Queen size.



You now have some choices to make as far as your layout goes, if you are making the <u>Crib Size project</u>:

Option A - MakeTWO 16" by 48" table runners (one for yourself, the other one for an easy gift!). As you lay out your blocks, try to keep the dark sides of the blocks in a consistent position. In other words, if a large dark triangle is in the upper left corner on your first block, continue to position all of the other blocks with a dark triangle in the upper left corner as well.

- OR -

Option B - Lay out your blocks so they are TWO rows across and THREE rows up and down. As you lay out your blocks, try to keep the dark sides of the blocks in a consistent position. In other words, if a large dark triangle is in the upper left corner on your first block, continue to position all of the other blocks with a dark triangle in the upper left corner as well.

For the <u>Lap size</u> project, you will lay out your blocks into FOUR rows with THREE blocks in each row. For the <u>Twin size</u>, lay out your blocks into FIVE rows with FOUR blocks in each row. For the <u>Super Queen size</u>, lay out your blocks into SEVEN rows with SIX blocks in each row.



Sew into rows, matching seams, then sew the rows together, again matching seams. Press again.

See?? Even though you started out with a diverse set of fabrics, you made something wonderful out of them! This is similar to the old story of "Stone Soup." If you have not read this classic children's book, check with your local librarian, who will be happy to find a copy for you to read. (A synopsis: It's basically about making "something" out of "nothing.")
