QUILTERS SUPPORT NEW HOSPICE—Diane Grover

On April 26, I had the honour and privilege to represent the Common Thread Quilt Guild at the official ribbon-cutting ceremony for a new hospice in Ottawa's east-end. La Maison de l'Est is an eight-bed hospice located within the Cité Parkway Retirement Residence close to Montfort Hospital. While intended to provide culturally appropriate palliative care to francophone residents in Ottawa and managed by Hospice Care Ottawa, the centre provides care in both official languages and supports all.



The hospice team had contacted our guild to request quilts for each of the beds and though the request was somewhat short notice, the Community Projects team were able to respond quickly. They promptly delivered eight colourful quilts to provide warmth and comfort to those in their final days.

BATTER UP!!!—Diane Grover

Batter Up – Ideas to Use Leftover Quilt Batting

After the great response to my series on how to use up large pieces of fabric from your stash (other than quilts), the obvious next focus is batting. Most of us have leftover pieces of batting ranging from long narrow strips cut from the edges of our quilt sandwiches to small off-cuts and odd-shaped pieces. Rather than toss them out, here are some ideas on how to use leftover quilt batting.

- 1. Frankenbatting. Just like Frankenstein's monster was made up of leftover parts stitched together, you can piece together your batting scraps. It's advisable not to mix batting material such as bamboo with wool or an 80/20 blend with 100% cotton, as the wear and texture will differ, possibly resulting in puckering or other visible surface differences. Place two pieces of batting together side by side with a 1"-2" overlap. Cut a straight line through the overlap and remove the small scraps. The two main batting pieces will now butt together evenly. You can machine stitch the pieces together using a wide zigzag stitch or you can join them together by hand using a whip stitch. A quick alternative is fusible batting tape, available at most quilt shops. You can even make your own fusible strips using non-woven lightweight fusible interfacing. Keep adding more pieces of leftover batting until you have a piece large enough for your project.
- 2. Small Projects. This is another easy way to use up your small batting pieces. Bags, placemats, mug rugs and wall-hangings all require small sections of batting that can be sourced from your off-cuts.
- 3. **Design Boards**. Design boards allow quilters to lay out fabric pieces in preparation for being sewn together. Cut a piece of foam core board and batting in your desired size, such as 19" square, 13" or 11". Glue the batting to one size of the foam core. Seal the edges using quilt binding (hot glue it over the edge) or wide masking tape. You may want to make a set of design boards in various sizes to fit your favourite quilt block dimensions.
- 4. Free-motion Practice. Make small quilt sandwiches out of two pieces of cotton and a piece of leftover batting and use them to practice your free-motion quilting. You can also test for tension and trial different threads before your final quilting.
- 5. **Reference Library.** You can use each sandwich that you made for quilting practice to showcase a different motif, creating your own reference library of quilting designs. Consider using different battings to illustrate how your quilting will look. Record directly on the batting sandwich the thread weight, needle and tension used so that you can better plan your quilting.
- 6. **Stuffing**. Batting scraps can be cut down into "confetti" and used as stuffing for pillows, pet beds or small cloth toys. Cut your batting scraps into small strips, approximately 2" wide. Run your rotary cutter back and forth across the strip repeatedly until you have small confetti-like pieces. You may need to keep a bag of these pieces and add to it as you process your batting scraps, saving them up for a suitable project. Just remember, the smaller the pieces, the less flat your stuffing will lie.
- 7. **Plate Liners**. If you only bring out the good china a few times a year, then you want to make sure that it's well-protected when it's stacked up in the cupboard. Cut squares of batting in sizes ranging from 6" to 10". Place them between plates to prevent chips and breaks.

Batter Up Continued - Ideas to Use Leftover Quilt Batting

- 8. **Packing Material**. You can also use quilt batting to wrap up your china cups and stemware, in place of bubble wrap or newspaper. In fact, any fragile item can benefit from being wrapped in a soft material made from natural sources such as wool, cotton or bamboo.
- 9. Cleaning Supplies. Use small pieces of quilt batting as dusters or as Swiffer cloths.
- 10. **Make-up Remover Pads**. Cut pieces of cotton batting into 2" squares. Use with your preferred make-up or eye make-up remover. Be sure that your batting does not have any glue residue or scratchy fibers that could irritate your skin.
- 11. **Pincushion**. Cut a strip of batting 1" wide by 12-18" long. Place a small stripe of white glue along one short edge and start rolling up the batting strip like a jellyroll. Place a small dab of glue on the inside of the batting strip every few inches as you continue to roll it up. Finish by glueing down the end of the strip. You can decorate the outside edge of your pincushion with a ribbon, ricrac or colourful embroidery floss. Place your pins in the top coiled edge of your new pincushion.
- 12. **Needlebook**. You may want to use pinking shears or a scalloped rotary cutter blade for this project. Cut three pieces of batting 3" by 7". Cut a piece of coloured felt or quilting cotton 3 $\frac{1}{2}$ " by 7 $\frac{1}{2}$ " for the cover. Place the cover right side down, then stack the batting pieces one on top of the other. Sew together through all four pieces down the middle to make a book. Decorate pages with ribbons, buttons or hand stitching, You can keep your hand or machine needles in this book, as well as hand embroidery needles and pins. (Photo: Nana Company)
- 13. **Cat Toy**. This project uses skinny leftover batting pieces, about ½" wide. Wind up the strip as if you are winding wool into a ball. Continue until you have a small ball ranging in size from a golf ball or tennis ball. Tuck the loose batting end into the ball. You can also glue or stitch down the end. You may want to tuck some catnip into the ball as you are winding the strips so your feline feels fine.
- 14. Indoor Bowling Ball. Similar to the cat toy, you can make a set of small "bowling" balls for use as an indoor bowling game. All you need are empty cereal boxes set upright to use as pins (these can be painted and decorated) and you have a fun and safe game for children that won't damage your home.
- 15. **Plant Ties**. Cut narrow strips of batting to use as soft plant ties that won't damage tender stalks or stems. You may want to braid together three strips to make a more durable tie.
- 16. Holiday Decorating.
- a. **Snow**. I have a delightful collection of miniature houses that I use to create Christmas village vignettes. I cover my side table with a large piece of batting for a snowy effect before placing my models.
- b. **Snowflake**. Cut snowflake shapes from small batting pieces. You can download designs, use a children's colouring book, or even use the Accuquilt snowflake die. Decorate your snowflake with beads, glitter paint or sequins and hang it up with monofilament thread. This project makes a fun holiday activity for children.





COMMUNITY PROJECTS STASHBUSTER! - Lynn Bradley and Maria Fleming

Step 1 of the Stashbuster event at the May's guild meeting was a success. It was such a joy to see and hear members discussing fabric pairing, checking sizes for backings, discussing how many quilts they could get out of the pre-made bundles... and generally embracing taking fabric to return as quilts for Community Projects. One collected fabrics to use to teach new quilters how to cut and sew basic blocks. Another found kids fabrics for the size quilt she has time to make. Others found more fabric, batting and backing for the many cuddle quilts they produce every month. Bundles with panels led to a number of discussions and idea swapping.

Step 2 is the December 10 guild meeting draw for all quilts using the Stashbuster fabric and returning by the December meeting. We handed out ballots for these at May meeting, and will have more at the Community Projects table for the meetings leading up to December 10. Just fill out the ballot and pin one to each quilt made from Stashbuster fabric. These can be returned at any meetings until December.

If you aren't able to complete by December for the draw, we will continue to receive any of those quilts as you finish them....no time line.

As there were no patterns included, the library has great resources, and when checked out in June, you will have it for 3 months over the summer. Yeah!

There are also the patterns and links to free patterns allowed by the publishers in the Resource section of our website https://commonthreadquiltguild.ca/resources/patterns/

The internet also provides a great selection of free and purchased patterns. Or dust off some of your shelved books and magazines, poor a cool drink and spend some time looking for inspiration and direction.

When looking at patterns, it would be appreciated if you would keep in mind our client's requests for sizes that work best for recipients:

- Cuddle quilts 22" square
- Kids quilts from crib to twin 40" x 40" to 60" x 72" (older teens may be tall)
- Adult quilts twin (60" x 72") to aueen
- Wheelchair quilts 36" x 36" to 36" x 40"


